## **Watercolor Techniques**

- Wax resist- use a white crayon to create a resist pattern and paint over with watercolor
- 2. Wet on wet- wet your paper and add wet watercolor to it
- 3. **Graded wash (wet)** wet your paper and add watercolor to, gradually showing value from dark to light
- 4. **Graded wash (dry)** Gradually show value from dark to light with one or two colors on dry paper
- 5. Lifting- Use tissue to lift color while paint is wet
- 6. Pointillism Use small dots of two colors to show a variation of tones
- 7. Masking- Experiment with using masking fluid (with a paintbrush) and masking tape; lay them down on white paper and then paint over. When dry, remove tape and erase fluid to show white. Also works with two colors.
- 8. Alcohol spotting (wet and dry): Splatter rubbing alcohol with your fingers or a toothbrush onto wet pigment. Also try with a dry base color and wet second layer.
- 9. **Splattering (wet):** Wet your paper and spatter paint using a toothbrush
- 10. Splattering (dry): Use a toothbrush to spatter paint onto dry paper
- 11. Salting: Sprinkle Kosher salt onto wet paint, try double colors as well
- 12. Bubble wrap: Lay bubble wrap on wet paint, remove when dry
- 13. Plastic wrap: Lay crumpled plastic wrap on wet paint, remove when dry. Experiment with two colors
- 14. Cheesecloth: Use tape to pull cheesecloth tight onto dry paper and paint over it, remove when dry
